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Stagnant stacks

- Our stacks were full and patron usage was down
- We were talking about weeding.
- We had moved old reference runs and old journals to a storage location. They weren't getting retrieved. After a lengthy review process, most were deaccessioned.
- The reference collection was heavily reviewed and many older sets either moved to stacks or were deaccessioned.

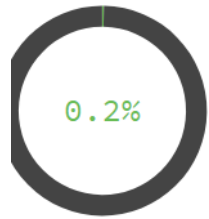
So...

- Architects came to provide possible renovation plans. In their statistics for building design, too much space was being taken up by volumes
- We paid for OCLC's GreenGlass product. It allows you to scope your collection and work on the areas you decide on.
- At the time they didn't work with serials. They do now. That means serials housed in general stacks are missed.
- We told them to put books about North Dakota or published in North Dakota in a special category. Those would then be able to be excluded from any lists we made.

Evaluating

- I used GreenGlass to pull a list of books from our general collections that met our Rare Book Policy criteria so they could be pulled and evaluated
- Bibliographers can create lists that include our barcodes based on call number. Once they have reviewed it, they can send it their faculty for comment.
- We had asked OCLC to identify high ILL partners, if held by the University of Minnesota, and how many libraries hold the title
- If there are over a hundred libraries and easily borrowed, it became a candidate to deaccession.



Public interface

- I extract the barcode column, run it through p-manage 70 and 62 CHECK to update the items with a code.
- Will worked with AI at ODIN to run a bi-weekly report that populates a program Will wrote using that code for our web page listing titles being considered for deaccessioning.
- People with und.edu email can request to reinstatate or request the deaccessioned copy for themselves.

Shared print

- OCLC Greenglass can be used in the OCLC Shared Print Program
- Libraries who agree to participate do a usage and overlap analysis
- The idea is that one or more of the libraries in a group agree to keep a copy of a title forever or for a set number of years allowing other libraries to deaccession that title
- A shared print holding type flag is set in WorldCat and the bib record gets a 583 and a LHR is created

Other projects

- We sent students to the stacks looking for duplicates as did shelvers. They were checked for usage. Very high usage AND very local we might keep 3 copies, but generally no more than 2. Low usage, only 1 copy.
- We collapsed a local history collection into the general stacks by following the same criteria.
- We moved State Documents out of Special Collections with the eventual goal of shelving in proximity to federal documents. In that process we also found a lot of duplication in Special Collections, documents and stacks. Again, we got rid of duplicates.

More

- We reviewed directories and yearbooks, especially those no longer received. We deaccessioned many old volumes.
- titles. If the title was held among our ILL partners, UofMINN, and 100 other libraries, we decided not to keep it.
- We decided not to keep newsletters and similar journals without long-lasting importance.
- We reviewed old general periodicals. Many of these were available in HathiTrust, so the title was cataloged as an online journal, noting the holdings available.

More and more

- British Parliamentary Debates have a great online index and are available through HathiTrust. So except for the very oldest volumes (rather rare), we deaccessioned those.
- Certain areas of study are no longer taught on campus, so those books we reviewed and generally deaccessioned, e.g. Home Economics, old Library Science, old medicine, etc. Outdated computer books were easy to do.
- We have made a concerted effort to buy JSTOR journal packages, so we can deaccession the print volumes. We would like to buy more.

More to do

- We are now at the stage of addressing philosophy, literature and history. This is much harder, but we will persevere.
- We are looking at old microform runs
- We are looking at more JSTSOR
- We are looking at long runs of old journals

What we have changed

- Despite very poor budgets for several years, we have moved from print to online databases and resources.
- We buy some ebooks instead of print
- We have cancelled most of our print journals in favor of online access.
- We catalog ebooks available through e-journal packages
- As a federal regional depository, we have to keep materials we have received. Whenever we can, we have selected online over print or microfiche. We catalog all federal online documents.
- As a state documents depository, we catalog online as much as possible in addition to the print we receive

Acquisitions changing

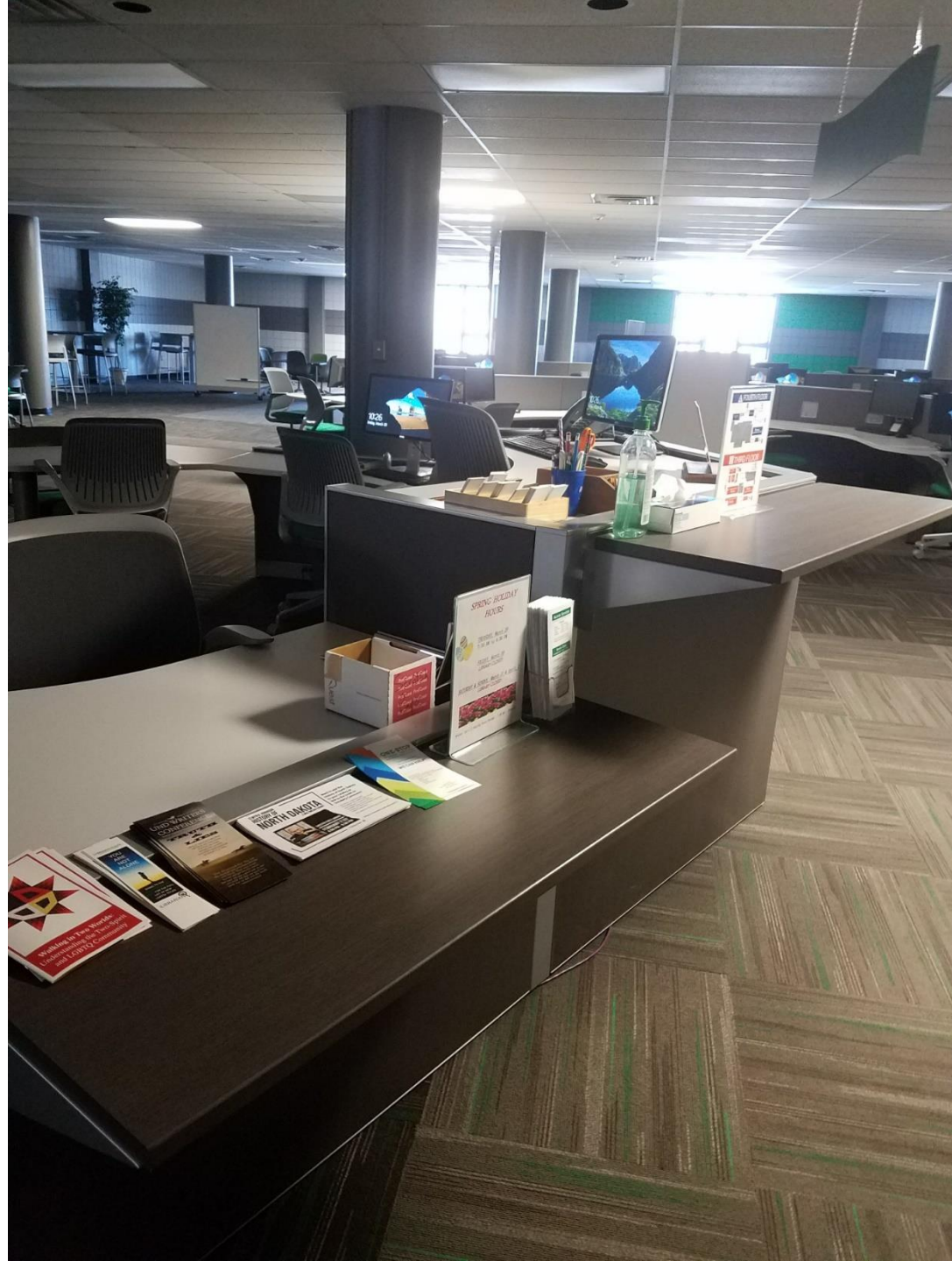
- We signed up for the JSTOR evidenced based package. We paid a set amount at the time. Based on usage, we will be able to pick which titles to keep. I created a separate Aleph collection for the EBA titles. For those we keep, the collection code will need to be changed, along with a few other edits. If we cancel, I will have to delete all the records – bummer.
- I utilize OCLC's WMS to generate files I can process through MarcEdit (and if I need to check for dups, also through Aleph) and add to the catalog.
- We have over 229,000 electronic resources in the catalog

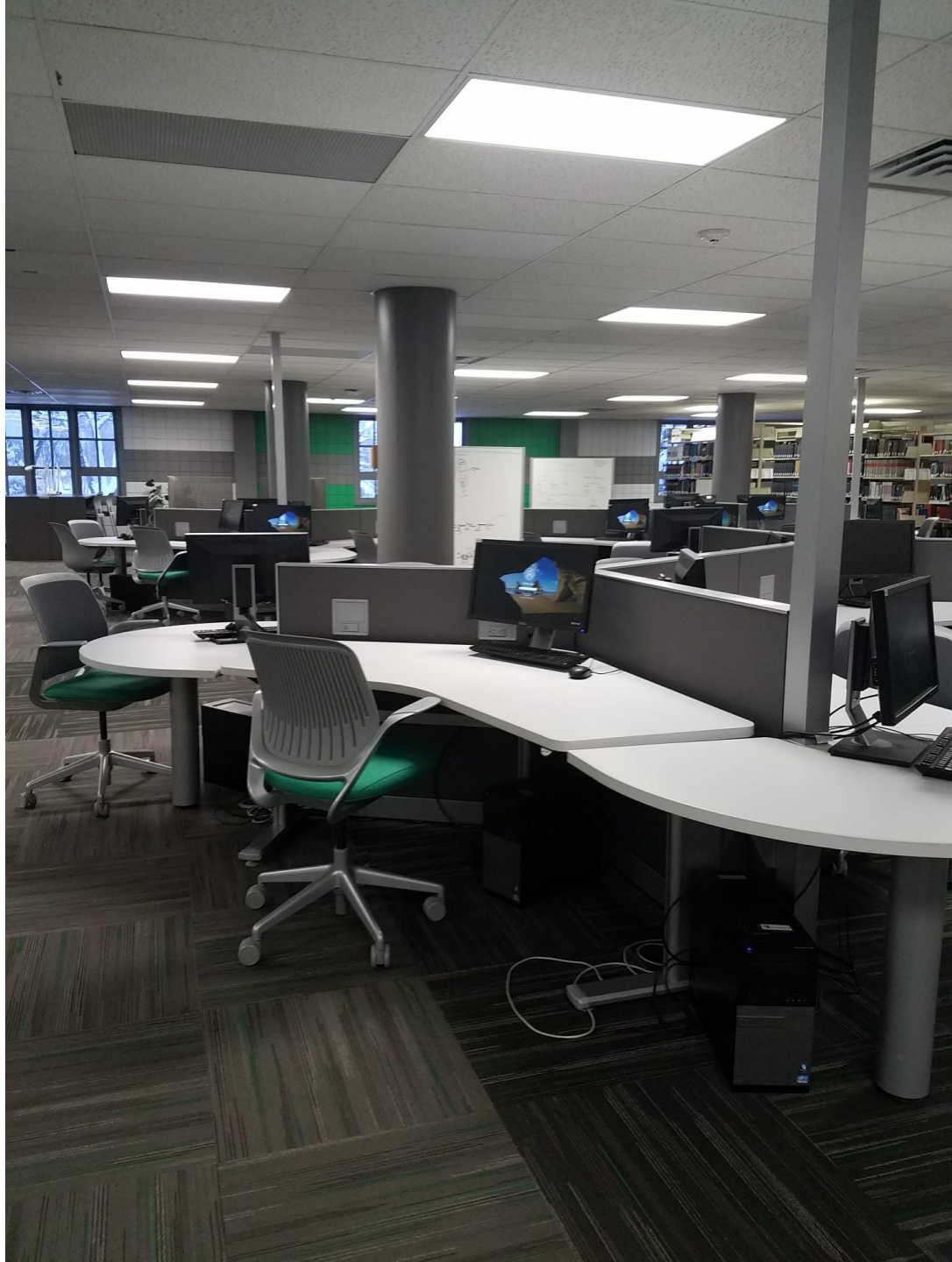
Why all this weeding and cataloging online?

- We want to be a modern library, not a book warehouse full of unused material. The collection needs to be dynamic.
- The space in the library needs to provide services people want to use.
- It is important that we refine our collections to appropriately meet users' needs. The practice of research and learning is changing and outputs are diversifying. The library needs to organize itself around the workflows of research and learners, including print and digital resources. Deaccession work is part of right-scaling management of print resources.

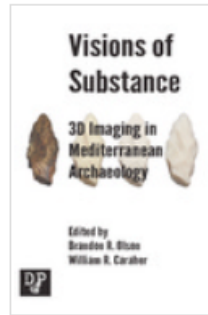
What's new

- We remodeled the original reference/study area. It is getting much more use since its upgrade
- We have established our institutional repository, Commons.und.edu . It will contain theses, digital images of local history, texts from our Archives, locally produced ebooks, large data sets, etc.
- We have installed a MagicBox to display a multi-media interactive exhibit. It can pull from multiple digital sources and display them to users who can manipulate the screen.

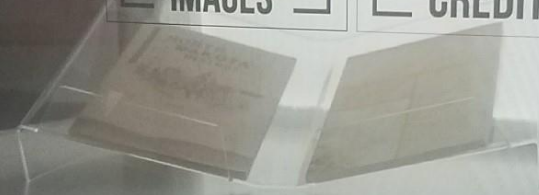

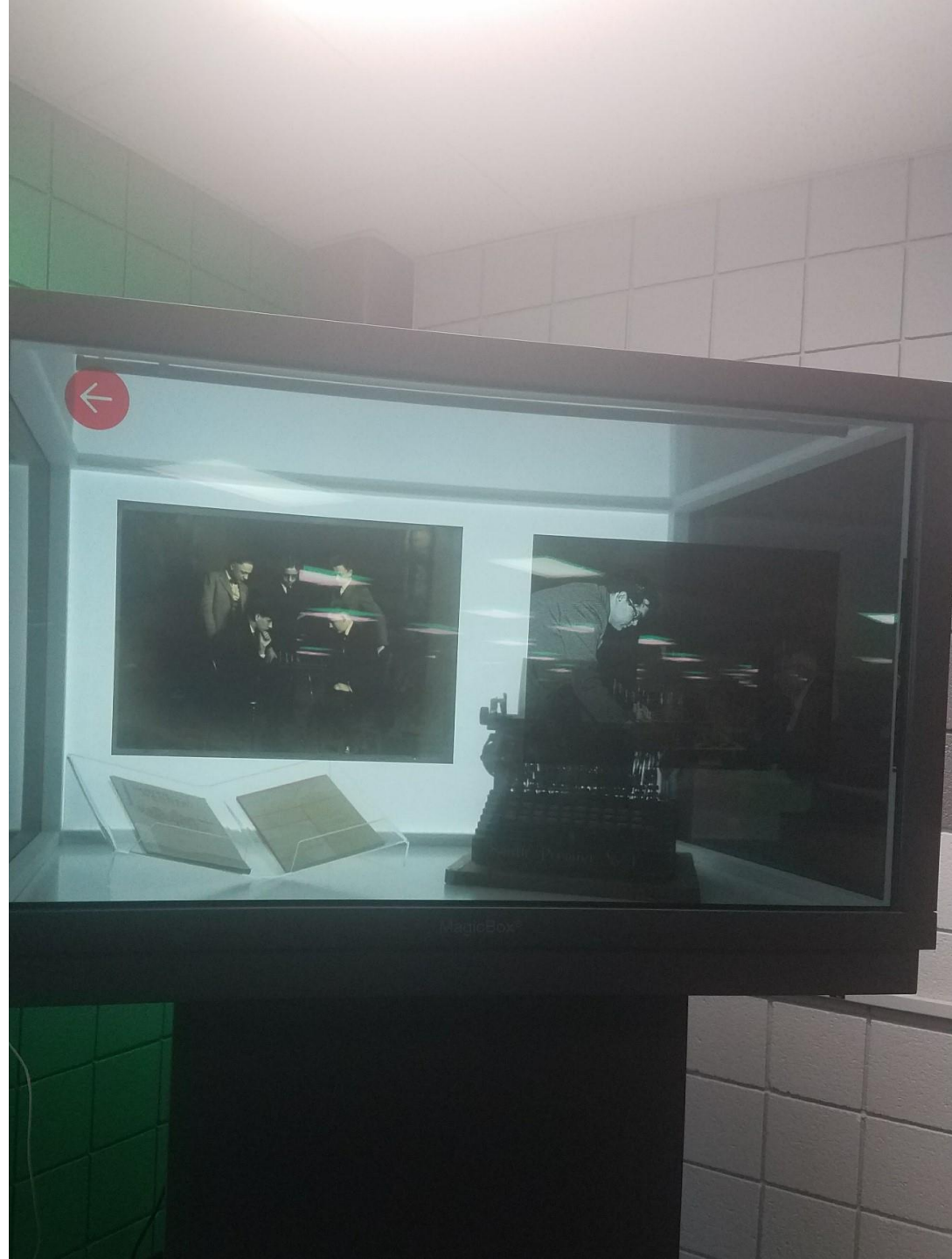

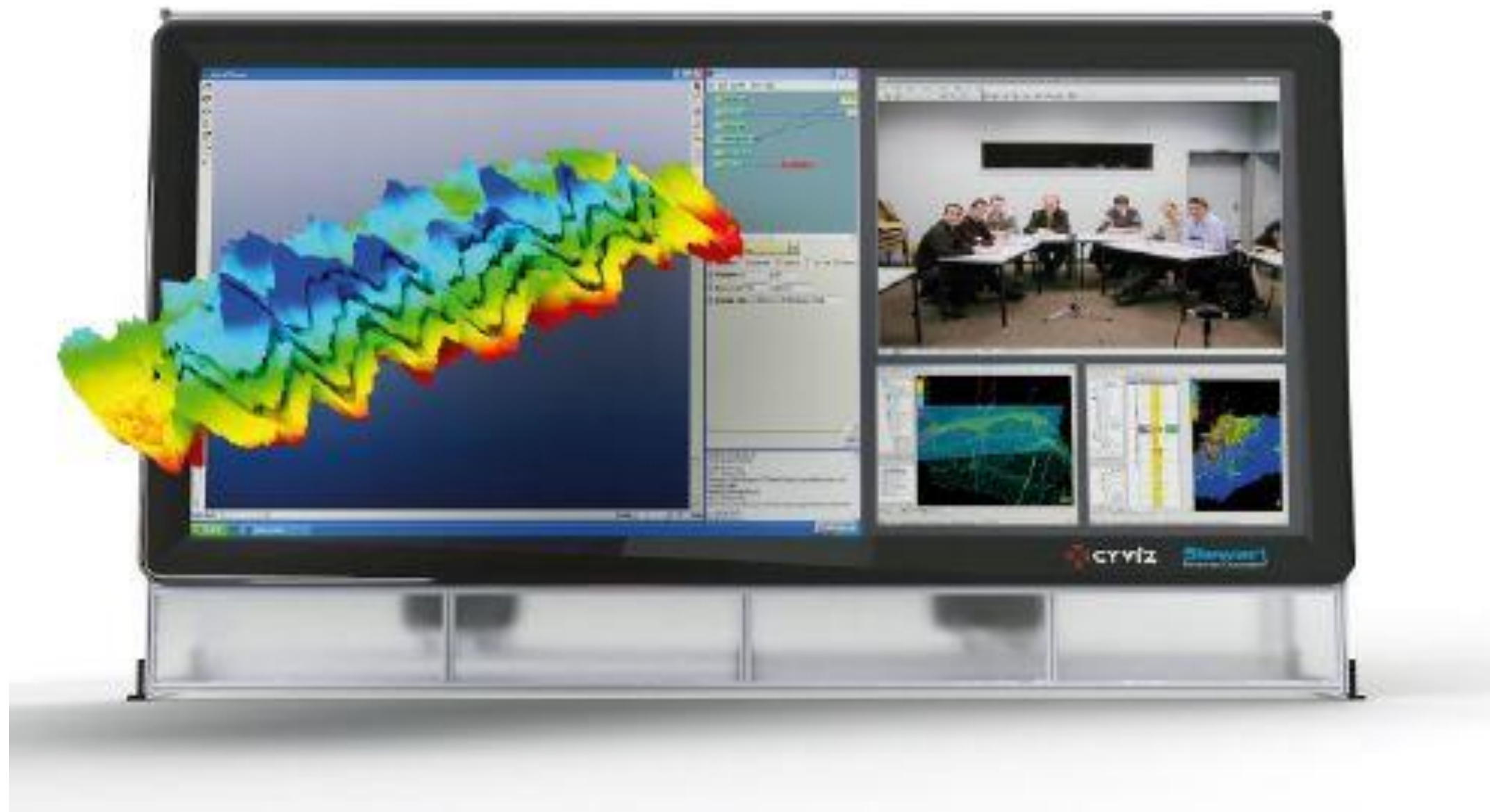

- We have a Video room. We hope to improve it's visibility by moving journals downstairs.
- We will soon have a data visualization wall. (formerly at: <http://und.edu/research/computational-research-center/visualization.cfm>)
- We will soon have a one-button studio where students can practice speaking, debating, interviewing, or creating a video for homework.
- We have 3 collab stations. Each workstation is mounted on a mobile cart with a 46-inch display. The workstations include a wireless keyboard and mouse. A webcam is integrated into each workstation for video group chat and conferencing
- We have print and microfilm scanners and will soon have a large format scanner we can use to digitize large format items.
- Sociology streaming videos from credo reference to be shown in classroom or through Blackboard
